The success of the rewards system has involved the learners going bowling in both Terms 2 & 3. Term 4 will see us heading to the cinema!



MOTOR VEHICLE WORKSHOP

For the last two terms our students have been busy working on their practical skills ready for practical assessments. These have mainly consisted of braking, suspension, vehicle pre-MOT inspections, cylinder head removal and balancing wheels.



Alongside that our Level 2's have been working on their Health and Safety and Engine assignments with a couple in particular scoring in the high 80s (90%) which is outstanding.

We have also had a visit from our awarding body, IMI and they were very happy with all our processes, policies and working practices.

In Term 4, 3 groups of students were able to attend an offsite Joinery unit on the Eurolink Business Park. This gave the students the chance to have a look at a work joinery shop.

The groups were met by the owner of Impression Joinery and shown how all the machines work, as well as their new CNC machine. This is a Computer Numerical Controlled machine in which pre-programmed computer software dictates the movement of the factory tools and machinery. They were all shown the spraying department where the wood is spray painted. This was an amazing opportunity for all the students to see if Joinery is something they may be interested in for their future.

On Thursday 21st March, Vince Luckhurst from Mirka came into College to provide a demo of all the amazing sanding machines they have to offer and to help the students understand how different machines are used within the building trade.

Vince was brilliant with the students and even got individuals to have a practice of all the different sanders they have to offer. The students were rewarded with hats, sunglasses and pens.

We would like to thank Vince for also giving us a contact for Johnstone's paints, who provided us with 5 pots of paints for the college.



This term in Skills for Life the learners have been learning about personal finance - the work completed will go towards their employability and progression pathways.

Why financial education is important?

Research shows that financial education makes young people more likely to:

- save money
- have a bank account
- be confident with money management

We have looked at different types of services banks offer and how they can benefit us. We have explored how and why we need to keep financial information safe and secure.

As part of our employability project, learners have had the opportunity to practice their ironing skills- many for the first time. They all did brilliantly, and we only had one small burn mark!!



In cooking the learners voted to cook spaghetti meatballs and lots of new skills were practiced from learning how to sauté to discussing kitchen hygiene.



Spaghetti and meatballs recipe

Ingredients

For the sauce

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 brown onion, chopped
- 1 garlic clove, finely chopped
- 1 tsp dried mixed herbs
- 400g tin tomatoes
- 500ml/18fl oz vegetable or beef stock (from a cube)
- 400g/14oz dried spaghetti
- salt and pepper

For the meatballs

- 400g/14oz beef mince and pork mince mix
- 1 garlic clove, finely chopped
- ¹/₂ tsp dried mixed herbs
- 1 tbsp olive oil

Method

1. Heat a large saucepan over a medium heat and add the olive oil. Once hot, add the onion and cook gently without browning for 4–5 minutes, or until softened and translucent. Add the garlic, continue to cook for 2 minutes until aromatic, then add the dried herbs, tomatoes and stock. Bring the sauce to a simmer, reduce the heat and simmer gently while you make the meatballs.

2. For the meatballs, mix together the beef, garlic and herbs along with a decent pinch of salt and pepper. Using wet hands roll into 20 balls.

3. Heat a frying pan over a medium heat and add the olive oil. Once hot, fry the meatballs on all sides until nicely coloured, being careful not to burn them. You may need to do this in batches. Transfer to the saucepan containing the sauce.

4. Continue to simmer the sauce for 10 minutes while you cook the spaghetti.

5. Bring a large saucepan water to the boil, add a pinch of salt and cook the spaghetti according to the packet instructions. Once cooked, drain and tip into the saucepan with the meatball sauce. Mix well and serve hot.


Preparation time 30 mins to 1 hour Serves 4
